

## **Sabina CVILAK Soprano**

Sabina Cvilak was born in Maribor, Slovenia, after her graduation she studied Voice in Graz and graduated with distinction in Singing.

She made her debut at Staatsoper **Hamburg** as Liu - a role she sang then in **Singapore** and at Festival **Savonlinna**, she became a member of the **Vienna** State Opera and sang there "Rigoletto", "Elisir d'amore", "Nozze di Figaro", "Zauberflöte", "Daphne", "Rheingold" and "Parsifal" but decided later to be a free lance artist.

In the following years she made her successful debuts in **Trieste** as Micaela, in **Cologne** as Mimi, in **Washington** as Mimi, in **Cardiff** as Liu and Micaela, in **Los Angeles** as Micaela, in **Palm Beach** as Desdemona, in **Helsinki** as Mimi, in **Valencia** as Marenka in "Bartered Bride", in **Hong Kong** as Mimi, in **Berlin** as Micaela, in **Bologna** as Nedda, in **Malmö** as Mimi, in **Nancy** as Vitellia in "Clemenza di Tito", from most of the theatres she got invited back for other roles.

She sang Mimi in **Palm Beach**, Lisa in "Land des Lächelns" in **Hong Kong**, Tatiana in **Malmö**, Katiana Kabanova, Tatiana, Sieglinde, Guttrune, Liu, Mimi, Blanche in "Dialogues des Carmélites" and "Tannhäuser" Elisabeth in **Wiesbaden**, "War Requiem" in **London, Madrid, Tokyo** and **Brussels** and Liu and Freia in **Maribor**.

Recent and future engagements through the 2025/26 season include "Simone Boccanegra", "Andrea Chenier", Manon Lescaut, Tosca, Magda and Butterfly in **Maribor** 9° Beethoven in **Beirut**, "Lady Macbeth from Mzensk" in **Frankfurt**, "Turandot" in **Helsinki** and Arabella, Katia Kabanova, Jenufa, Butterfly and Gräfin Mariza in **Wiesbaden**, "Creation" in **Soria**, Spain, a concert with Placido Domingo in **Ljubljana**, Lyrische Symphonie by Zemlinsky in **Buenos Aires** and Elisabeth in "Tannhäuser" and Rosalinde in **Tokyo**.

Concert engagements brought her to **Monte Carlo, Wiesbaden, Dresden, Frankfurt, Paris, New York, London, Amsterdam, Istanbul, Turin**, she sang 8° Mahler, "War Requiem", 2° Mahler, "Vier letzte Lieder", Dvorak's "Stabat Mater", Brahms Requiem, to name a few.
